## Heartworm

Why give your dog heartworm pills? Most pills for heartworm also cover other types of worms that your dog can pick up such as hookworm, roundworm, and whipworm.

Out of the 4 major types of worm that most pills protect your dog from, heartworm is the only one that is carried by mosquito. So, if you live in the north, it will be harder for the worms to find a host in the winter. In the summer however, they can always find plenty of mosquitoes to move them around.

The other three are all transmitted through feces or from a mother to the puppies. If your dog ingests poop from another animal that was infected, they can get these worms. In the case of hookworm, all your pet has to do is step on the larva and it will work its way through the skin and into the blood stream where it will move to the heart or digestive system depending on the type of worm.



Some people have asked why they should give their dogs this type of medicine in the winter. If you never see a mosquito in the winter and your dog does not come into contact with any feces from any animals, then by all means, skip the medicine in the winter. However, you may want to have your dog tested yearly for these types of worms then, since it is almost impossible to ensure that your pet did not come into contact with another animal's poop. Deer, rabbits, rats, and mice can all be carriers and your pet can pick up these worms from any of their feces. Even walking on them or rolling in them can cause an infection. Some of these worms can also be gotten by humans, so you don't want your dog getting sick from any of these worms. Keeping them on the medicine is a small price to pay to keep yourself and your family safe.

What about those magazines who sell the pet medications at a cheaper price? Are they worth trying out? Well, that depend on how much you are paying at your vet. Most veterinarians prices are not that much higher and if you take into consideration the cost of shipping, they may be the same price. Also, be cautious of the age of medicine you order through the mail. A lot of times, these medicines are either out of date or will be in a matter of days or weeks. Is it worth the risk of your pet getting

sick from old or bad medicine to pay ten cents less a pill? Personally, I don't think it is. My dogs will be on heartworm medicine year round and I will keep getting it from my vet where I know it is good and won't make my dogs sick.

## Rabies

A study is under way to determine how long the vaccine stays in our pets bodies and when another booster is actually necessary. In older dogs, any booster shots can be a potential problem. ## AKC Canine Health Foundation Call for Samples

This call for samples may not exactly pertain to our breed, but if you know someone who has one of the breeds listed below. Please share the information with them. Our breed may benefit from this study of reactions to vaccinations as well.

Allergic reactions continue to be the most common adverse event associated with vaccination in dogs. Recent research has demonstrated that small dogs in general, and several specific breeds, are at higher risk for these reactions. Laboratory studies have shown that normal dogs make antibodies against many vaccine components, even though they may not show an allergic reaction immediately following vaccination. Although the

specific cause of allergic reactions in dogs remains unknown, vaccine components residual from the manufacturing process have been incriminated. These specific components need to be identified, so that manufacturers can make safer vaccines for dogs.

Researchers including Dr. George Moore at the Purdue University School of Veterinary Medicine – with funding provided by the AKC Canine Health Foundation – are looking to identify causes of vaccine-induced allergic reactions. Using serum from dogs of high-risk breeds, this study will compare antibody concentrations in dogs demonstrating allergic reactions versus antibody concentrations in dogs of the same breed that don't have reactions. To complete this study, samples are urgently needed from 5 high-risk breeds including the Dachshund, Pug dog, Chihuahua, Boston Terrier, and Miniature Pinscher.

Your dog may participate in this study if they are a member of this group, and have been vaccinated in the past three weeks.

## Dog Laws in PA

There is a proposal in Pennsylvania to change the dog laws. First is a proposal to change the laws regarding how animals are raised and cared for. At this time, the small time breeder does not seem to be too adversely effected by the proposed changes, but if you have more than fifty dogs and puppies in your home in one year, it could effect you. The original proposal did not allow as many dogs per year, so the changes that have been made to the proposal so far are great, in my opinion. A large number of hunting breed people are unhappy because they may have more dogs than that.

There is also a proposal to change the tail docking laws in our state to say that if the puppy is older than 1 week, the docking must be done by a veterinarian. This change should not effect many people because I have never heard of a breeder docking tails after 1 week of age.

One law that has been on the books in this state for a long time is about ear cropping. The owner of a dog who's ears were cropped whether they are from this state or not must provide proof that the dogs ears were cropped by a veterinarian. Personally, I have always gotten my dogs cropped by a vet, and I can't believe someone would do this themselves, but I am sure it must happen. As far as I can find in my research, there has never been any enforcement of this law for those showing dogs in this state, but they are trying to change this law to fix the wording so that those from outside the state don't have to worry about it. However, my question is... How does a puppy buyer know or even get a certificate for how their dogs ears were cropped? I would never ask the breeders of the dogs I purchased, but it may be something we all need to do in the future if this law stays the way it is now.

## Animal Control

With the new Animal Control center in Pennsylvania, it is now possible to call an 800 number and anonymously leave a tip about anyone abusing an animal or about a vicious or annoying animal. This means that if you have a neighbor who hates you or your barking dog, they can call and report it without stating who they are and make up false charges if they really want to. So, what should you do if Animal Control comes knocking at your door?

Don't let them in! Why should you not let them in? Anything they can see can be used against you, from a building code violation, zoning violation, ordinance violation, or even a violation of the fire code. So, don't even stand there and talk to them through the open door because if they see too many things plugged into a socket, they can worm their way in and find more violations. Remember, anything they can see may be used against you. Just go outside and close and possibly lock the door. IF they can't see it, they won't be able to report the violation! If they claim to have a warrant, make sure they do. Demand to see it. On their first visit, I doubt they will actually

have a warrant. For those with a kennel license, check your agreement and verify that you have not signed something stating that you must let them in. If you have, you will have to make a decision between letting them in and losing that kennel license. Lastly make sure everyone in your home knows not to let anyone from animal control into the house because if anyone from the home gives them permission, they can get in.

Don't say anything that might be used against you. Just tell animal control your name. Remember that anything you say that might incriminate you can and probably will be used against you in court. Be polite yet firm and above all don't lie! If the questions are going down the wrong line, insist on speaking to your lawyer before you answer them. Make sure you get the badge number and name of the animal control officers as well as the agency they are from. You have a right to know what the complaint is, if possible who made the complaint in the first place.

How can you prevent a visit. Keep your pet's area clean and try to avoid being on bad terms with your neighbors. Also, if you have close neighbors, try to keep the barking to a minimum.

February 16, 2008

The meeting was called to order by our president Diane Mitchell.

**Treasurer's Report:** Bob submitted the end-of-year Treasurer's Report for 2007. A motion was made by John and seconded by Mary Lu that the report be accepted. Bob also submitted the Treasurer's Report to date for 2008. A motion was made by John and seconded by Mary Lu that the

report be accepted. Bob noted that 2008 membership dues are due.

**Secretary's Report:** Jill noted that correspondence from the AKC had been received questioning our intention to hold an event on August 2, 2008.
